THE REAL FASCIST

I am sure that I, and the vast majority of those who support leaving the EU, regard ourselves as, and indeed are, decent and honourable people, who put concern for the future of democracy in these islands before any considerations of personal advantage, and that we have thought long and hard about the issues involved. Equally, Americans who chose to vote for Donald Trump are patriots who have responded to his anti establishment message, and merely wish to see the interests of the American people given precedence over the demands of other groups. Neither they, nor we, have malign intentions, and only wish for the democracies in which we live to respect the rights and desires of the majority, rather than always elevating the agendas of minorities above ours .

However, if one listens to the supporters of the Remain side in the UK, or the anti Trump lobbies in the US, one would believe that in fact we are either morons who don't understand the issues, gullible fools easily deceived by lies, or supporters of far right policies, somewhat akin to the fascists of the Thirties.

DEEP AND SPECIAL

In the week leading up to the August Bank Holiday, the Department for Exiting the European Union published five so-called “Position Papers” which set out the Government’s aspirations in different policy areas, without going into much detail as to how these aspirations will be realised.

Frustrating as this vagueness was, the most annoying feature of these papers was something else – the repeated use of the phrase “deep and special.” The position paper on enforcement and dispute resolution, for example, begins “*The United Kingdom wants to build a new, deep and special partnership with the European Union.*” No one would dispute the word “new”. We will no longer be a member state so a new relationship will be inevitable, but will it really be “deep and special?” the phrase sounds a bit soppy and implies that we really want to be the closest of buddies. Actually, we don’t and the EU doesn’t want to either.

To illustrate the point, some of us may recall during our courting days going out with a person who was unquestionably very pleasant and whose company we enjoyed but one day, a harsh reality took hold. For all their good points, this person was not someone with whom we could envisage spending the rest of our lives. The relationship was going nowhere. All the same, even after reaching this conclusion, it wasn’t easy to end the relationship, especially if you still liked each other. To soften the blow in such a situation therefore, both partners may say “let’s stay friends.” This is an understandable emotional response. You don’t hate your former girlfriend/boyfriend in the slightest, you feel a bit guilty and don’t want to hurt their feelings any more than necessary, but the idea that “we can still be friends” just doesn’t correspond to reality in most cases.

For many of us who voted for Brexit, we would not want to describe the EU as pleasant at all. It wasn’t an institution we ever liked and we won’t shed any tears about regaining our sovereignty or feel any sense of remorse or guilt about bringing our membership to an end. Brexit is going to be more like an acrimonious divorce

than a sad, slightly reluctant parting of the ways by a courting couple.

Of course, we have got to continue to trade with the EU and to cooperate with it in all sorts of areas from managing air traffic to the extradition of criminals. The EU will remain a close neighbour geographically and we will still share a land border with the EU on the island of Ireland and on a clear day, be able to see another EU member state, France, from the cliffs of

Folkestone and Dover.

We don’t want a hostile power on our very doorstep and we will still be keen to extend a welcome to EU citizens when they come to our

holidaymakers while very much hoping that we can continue to enjoy our vacations in the Mediterranean sunshine of France or Spain.

Nonetheless, we voted for Brexit because we wanted to bring a long, unhappy relationship to an end. We have been viewed in Brussels since the late 1970s as “the awkward partner.” We showed no enthusiasm for the EU’s two flagship projects – the Euro and the Schengen borderless area. We sought more derogations from EU legislation than any other state. We were always the foot-draggers who didn’t feel comfortable with the idea of an EU army, an EU diplomatic service or an EU budget. We didn’t like the EU making laws for us; we didn’t like EU fishing boats taking 59% of the total catch in our waters; we didn’t like subsidising French farmers through the Common Agricultural Policy and felt very unhappy that our hospitality was stretched to breaking point by the arrival of hundreds of thousands of people from the former Soviet bloc after 2004.

Furthermore, the Brexit vote was a chance to embrace the wider world. Ted Heath’s deceit in dragging us unwittingly into a project which was all about political union erected barriers between us and the countries with whom many of us really do feel a “deep and special” relationship – countries like Australia, New Zealand and Canada who found themselves suddenly shut out of our markets in 1973. Even

after over 40 years in the European project, the inhabitants of these countries feel far closer to us than, say, a Finn or a Lithuanian thanks to the common bond of language, law, culture and monarch.

Those of us who attended the Campaign for an Independent Britain's annual rally last April heard Philip Benwell of the Australian Monarchists League speak very bluntly about the sense of betrayal felt in his country during the 1970s. Thankfully, our Commonwealth friends are willing to forgive us and indeed, to help us in practical ways. Given our lack of experience in negotiating trade deals, it was most encouraging to read that Crawford Falconer, a New Zealander, has been appointed chief trade negotiation adviser at the Department for International Trade.

So a likely strengthening of the links with the Anglophone world and a slow reorientation of our trade away from the EU will only add to the sense of divergence from the interests of the EU upon Brexit. We will no longer have any interest in helping the EU with its empire-building in the Balkans and the former Soviet republics. The EU is currently engaged in a renewed propaganda campaign to boost support for membership in Serbia, a country which is becoming less and less enthusiastic about joining the EU. Many Brexit voters, myself included, would rejoice if the Serbs rejected EU membership if and when a vote on accession takes

place. After many years of campaigning to end the UK's membership of the EU, we wouldn't wish the same fate on our worst enemies. That's a measure of how strongly we dislike the EU as an institution, viewing our membership as a badge of shame.

Indeed, I would go further. While not wishing to see a sudden implosion of the EU, which would create serious economic problems right across the Continent, including the UK. a gradual peeling-off of one member state after another would be a good thing. No one, especially if they were not born at the time, can criticise the legitimate desire of the EU's earliest supporters to avoid a repeat of the horrors of two world wars which had devastated the continent. Their solution - the subsuming of nation states into a bureaucratic behemoth - especially given the devious means used - was nonetheless a very foolish idea and one which we are convinced, is ultimately doomed to failure. Do we really want a "deep and special partnership" with an organisation which is a huge, tragic mistake?

Of course, such forthright language is not suitable for use by government ministers. A degree of diplomacy and tact is required by the Government in the Brexit negotiations, but perhaps a bit of honesty might not go amiss either. We do seek a working relationship with the EU so that business can carry with the minimum degree of disruption but "deep and special"? I don't think so!
